Essentria IC3/(Rosemary Oil, Geraniol 600, Peppermint Oil), ECOSMART Wasp & Hornet Killer/(Peppermint Oil, 2-Phenethyl Propionate), Monterey Weed Impede (Surflan Herbicide)/ Oryzalin, Eraser A/P/Glyphosate-isopropylammonium, Talstar P/Bifenthrin, Taurus SC/Fipronil, Prodiamine 65 WDG/Prodiamine.
